A study examines the harmful gap between the theory of restorative justice (RJ) and its application in programs in the U.S., Europe, and elsewhere. Data were obtained from four surveys of restorative justice practitioners using a combination of qualitative methodologies, including questionnaire responses, interviews, and focus groups.

Providing a critical perspective on the aspirations of advocates of restorative justice and the direction in which restorative justice is developing, this book offers an empirically researched contribution to theoretical debates. Drawing on qualitative research, the book examines the significant gaps that exist between the ideals of proponents of restorative justice and the objectives being pursued in practice. The work examines ways forward for the restorative justice movement and the development of practices with a coherent set of restorative justice ideals.

Restorative justice has emerged around the world as a potent challenge to traditional models of criminal justice, and restorative programmes, policies, and legislative reforms are being implemented in many western nations. However, the underlying aims, values, and limits of this new paradigm remain somewhat uncertain, and those advocating restorative justice have rarely engaged in systematic debate with those defending more traditional conceptions of criminal justice. Restorative justice has made significant progress in recent years and now plays an increasingly important role in and alongside the criminal justice systems of a number of countries in different parts of the world. In many cases, however, successes and failures, strengths and weaknesses have not been evaluated sufficiently systematically and comprehensively, and it has been difficult to gain an accurate picture of its implementation and the lessons to be drawn from this. Restorative Justice in Practice addresses this need by analyzing the results of the implementation of three restorative justice schemes in England and Wales in the largest and most complete trial of restorative justice with adult offenders worldwide. It aims to bring out the practicalities of setting up and running restorative justice schemes in connection with criminal justice, the costs of doing so, and the key professional and ethical issues involved. At the same time, the book situates these findings within the growing international academic and policy debates about restorative justice, addressing a number of key issues for criminal justice and penology, including how far victim expectations of justice are and can be met by restorative justice aligned with criminal justice, whether community is involved in restorative justice for adult offenders, and how this relates to social capital, how far restorative justice events relate to processes of desistance, giving up crime, promoting reductions in reoffending, and link to resettlement. and how this relates to victim and offender needs the usefulness of conferencing and mediation as forms of restorative justice with adults restorative justice in practice will be essential reading for both students and practitioners and a key contribution to the restorative justice debate

restorative justice has developed rapidly from being a barely known term to occupying a central role in debates on the future of criminal justice but as it has become part of the mainstream of debate so new tensions and issues have emerged one of the most crucial issues is to find an appropriate combination of restorative justice based essentially on informal deliberation and the law the

past methods of probation and parole supervision have largely relied on caseworkers who monitor their clients as well as they can but as numbers of clients increase studies indicate that this model is ineffectual the time has come to significantly rethink the approaches to community supervision as described in what is community justice the aim of the new efforts is to explicitly integrate the community and the criminal justice process in probation programs there are five key goals that this book addresses to achieve this end the building of partnerships between community supervision agencies and the community expanding the client definition to include the victim of crime the family of the offender and the community itself focus on places agencies must take into account important local differences in neighborhoods preventing problems between the community and the client rather than reacting to them adding value to community life this book addresses the specific ways of achieving these goals by presenting six case studies of probation programs that represent a practical side of the community justice ideal what emerges is a provocative and enlightening new approach to the problems of probation and parole

this book based on a large scale research project funded by the national institute of justice and the robert wood johnson foundation provides an overview of the restorative justice conferencing programs currently in operation in the united states paying particular attention to the qualitative dimensions of this based on interviews focus groups and ethnographic observation it provides an unrivalled view of restorative justice conferencing in practice and what the people involved felt and thought about it the book looks at four structural variations in the face to face form of restorative decision making family group conferences victim offender mediation dialogue neighborhood accountability boards peacemaking circles the authors address two issues that have received limited research

emphasis in restorative justice the lack of clear and consistent standards and the absence of testable theories of intervention that reflect what has become a rather diverse practice in response the authors conclude with a proposed structure for principle based evaluation designed to test emerging theories of restorative decision making
